

2.0 Million Nevadans reside in a primary care health professional shortage area or "HPSA" or 67.3% of the states population




2.2 Million Nevadans reside in a dental HPSA or 72.0% of the states population, including 100% of Washoe County and Carson City

Primary Care Workforce Shortages

- 2.0 million Nevadans reside in a primary care health professional shortage area or "HPSA" or 67.3% of the state's population
- Majority of Clark and Washoe County residents live in a primary care HPSA
- 11 single-county HPSAs in rural and frontier areas of Nevada
